Mr. Canon is also an adjunct professor of civil rights and criminal justice as well as a lecturer for the Kentucky Justice Association, the National Business Institute, and other organizations providing continuing legal education credits in topics related to municipal/government litigation, police liability, employment law, and human resources, among others.
