Pay dues and assessment, file statement, file trust account disclosure to avoid penalties and ineligibility

he 2019-20 Louisiana State Bar Association membership dues, the Louisiana Attorney Disciplinary Board assessment, the Attorney Registration Statement and the Louisiana Supreme Court Trust Account Disclosure and Overdraft Notification Authorization were all due on July 1.

Delinquency notices were mailed the first week of August to members who have not complied. Members who have not complied by end of business on Monday, Sept. 16, will be certified ineligible to practice law.

Attorneys who fail to timely pay their assessment and dues and file their registration statement and trust account disclosure will ultimately be subject to monetary penalties and certification of ineligibility to practice law, pursuant to the Association's By-Laws and the Supreme Court's Rule XIX.

Note on electronic payments: Confirm with your financial institution prior to making an ACH electronic check payment. If your account is Positive Pay Protected, update the Company ID to 1000091175.

LBLS accepting certification applications in bankruptcy law

The Louisiana Board of Legal Specialization (LBLS) is accepting applications for certification in business bankruptcy law and consumer bankruptcy law through Sept. 30, 2019.

In accordance with the Plan of Legal Specialization, a Louisiana State Bar Association member in good standing who has been engaged in the practice of law on a full-time basis for a minimum of five years may apply for certification. Further requirements are that, each year, a minimum percentage of the attorney's practice must be devoted to the area of certification sought, and the attorney must pass a written examination to demonstrate sufficient knowledge, skills and proficiency in the area for which certification is sought and provide five favorable references. Peer review is used to determine that an applicant has achieved recognition as having a level of competence indicating proficient performance handling the usual matters in the specialty field. Refer to the LBLS Bankruptcy Law Standards (business and consumer) for a detailed description of the requirements: *www.lsba. org/specialization*.

In addition, applicants must meet a minimum CLE requirement for the year in which application is made and the examination is administered. For bankruptcy law, CLE is regulated by the American Board of Certification (ABC), the testing agency.

With regard to applications for business bankruptcy law and consumer bankruptcy law certification, although the written test(s) is administered by the ABC, attorneys should apply for approval of the LBLS simultaneously with the testing agency to avoid delay of board certification by the LBLS. Information concerning the ABC will be provided with the application form(s) and can be viewed online at: *www.abcworld.org*.

Lawsuit challenges mandatory LSBA membership; 8th Circuit concludes Janus does not alter prior grant of summary judment in Bar's favor

Louisiana State Bar Association (LSBA) member filed suit against the LSBA, the Louisiana Supreme Court and the Justices of the Court on Aug. 1, challenging mandatory Bar membership on First and 14th amendment grounds.


In a similar challenge involving the State Bar Association of North Dakota (*Fleck v. Wetch*), on Aug. 30, a three-judge panel of the U.S. 8th Circuit Court of Appeals found that the Bar's procedures for collecting mandatory membership fees do not violate the First Amendment. The panel had previously ruled in favor of the Bar, but the U.S. Supreme Court vacated and remanded that ruling for reconsideration in light of *Janus v. AFSCME*. In its recent decision, the 8th Circuit concluded that *Janus* does not alter its prior grant of summary judgment in favor of the Bar. Mandatory membership in a state Bar and payment of compulsory fees were held constitutional in *Keller v. State Bar of California*, 496 U.S. 1 (1990), and *Lathrop v. Donohue*, 367 U.S. 820 (1961), and the LSBA operates in accordance with these decisions.

The LSBA's legislative advocacy is subject to a number of provisions set forth in the Association's Bylaws. These activities are limited to matters involving issues affecting the profession, the regulation of attorneys and the practice of law, the administration of justice, the availability and delivery of legal services to society, the improvement of the courts and the legal profession, and other matters consistent with the mission and purposes of the Association.

The LSBA will vigorously defend its mandatory structure, established by the Louisiana Supreme Court nearly 80 years ago to aid in the administration of justice and assist with the regulation of the practice of law.

LSBA Young Lawyers Division Award Nominations Deadline: September 15, 2019

ominations are open for the Louisiana State Bar Association (LSBA) Young Lawyers Division (YLD) awards. To be eligible for consideration, individual nominees must be current members of the YLD (attorneys who have not yet reached the age of 39 or who have been admitted to the practice of law for fewer than five years) in good standing. The YLD Council selects award winners from recommendations made by a committee of young lawyers appointed from throughout the state.

► Outstanding Young Lawyer Award. This award is given to a young lawyer who has made exceptional contributions to the legal profession and his/her community. In determining the award recipient, the YLD considers several factors, including the nominee's service to the public and community, the nominee's service to the legal profession, the nominee's service to the LSBA YLD, awards and achievements received during the nominee's legal career, challenges the nominee may have overcome, and specific examples of the nominee's outstanding characteristics. Present or former members of the YLD Council are ineligible.

► Outstanding Local Affiliate. This award is given to a local affiliate organization that has impacted the lives of young lawyers in an outstanding way. In determining the award recipient, the YLD considers several factors, including the organization's service to the public, service to the legal profession, success of initiatives that serve the public and the profession, challenges overcome, creative use of resources, involvement of young lawyers in programming and services, and inclusiveness.

▶ Program of the Year. Innovative CLE builds a bridge between civil and criminal justice

he Louisiana State Bar Association Access to Justice Commission's Building Bridges and Modest Means Committees hosted a CLE, "Successful Re-Entry: Addressing Legal Needs after Incarceration," to recruit and educate attorney volunteers of the New Orleans Re-Entry Legal Clinic and attorneys listed on the Modest Means Directory. The CLE programming was designed to provide information on how to assist formerly incarcerated clients with their most pressing civil legal issues, such as obtaining a driver's license and handling consumer debt collection matters.

The New Orleans Re-Entry Legal Clinic is operated by the Justice and Accountability Center of Louisiana, The First 72+ and Southeast Louisiana Legal Services (SLLS) and offers walk-in civil legal assistance once a month to people who have recently returned from incarceration. This free legal aid helps ensure that returning citizens get back on their feet quickly and avoid becoming mired in legal issues and debt that could ultimately return them to incarceration.

The Modest Means Directory is an online directory that connects attorneys with clients whose income falls in the gap between eligibility for legal aid and ability to afford a full-cost attorney. Attorneys who choose to be listed on the directory offer affordable legal options with sliding scale payment, flat fees or limited-scope representation. Because many of the patrons of the Re-Entry Legal Clinic fall into this income eligibility gap and require legal assistance beyond what is provided on site at the clinic, the directory is used as a resource for these individuals to obtain affordable legal assistance.

Overall, the session fits into the Building Bridges Committee's larger goal of "trying to get both sides of the justice system, the civil and criminal side, to come together to better address the legal issues folks

caught up in the system face," SLLS Executive Director Laura Tuggle explained in her opening remarks. In this way, legal professionals can respond "as a coordinated system to break down policy issues, address systemic barriers, and include direct services to individuals," with the ultimate goal of ensuring that returning citizens successfully reintegrate into the community rather than returning to incarceration.

Both the Re-Entry Legal Clinic and the Modest Means Directory are seeking attorneys to participate in the programs. Legal professionals offer training to area librarians



LSBA Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson Trailblazer Award

The LSBA Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson Trailblazer Award was established in 2016. It combined two previous diversity awards the Trailblazer Award (established in 2013) and the Human Rights Award (established in 2010). The Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson Trailblazer Award is awarded by the Association annually in June at the LSBA's Annual Meeting.

The nomination period runs from October through February.

This award recognizes individual attorneys and judges who champion the ideals set forth by Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson, the first African-American chief justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court, who has always exhibited an unwavering commitment to enhancing diversity and inclusion in the legal profession.

Nominees must be admitted to practice in Louisiana. Judges must have been elected or appointed to a state or federal court in Louisiana; the lawyer or judge can be on active or inactive status and from any practice setting; and the lawyer or judge cannot be a current member of the LSBA's Committee on Diversity in the Legal Profession.

The Chief Justice Bernette Joshua Johnson Trailblazer Award recipient should demonstrate a unique blend of experience, skills and accomplishments which translate into successful diversity and inclusion efforts which include, but are not limited to, the following:

► supporting and encouraging attorneys who are members of an unrepresented group within the legal profession to reach their career and personal potential;

▶ ensuring opportunities for the advancement of diverse people through mentoring efforts and diversity outreach;

► commitment to addressing issues of equality, fairness and injustice in the legal profession; and

► participation in community service activities which promote and broaden the diversity pipeline to the legal profession.

Guardian of Diversity Award

The Guardian of Diversity Award, established in 2013, recognizes nonprofit groups, local and specialty bar associations, and public interest organizations that implement and advance diversity programs to promote and support diversity in the legal community. It is presented at the LSBA's Annual Meeting.

The nomination period is October through February.

Nominees can be bar associations, courts, law firms/departments, or community organizations (including nonprofits and public interest organizations).

Recipients should demonstrate the

following diversity and inclusion efforts:

► creating and implementing innovative strategies to promote and advance the concept and spirit of diversity and inclusion in society;

▶ making a significant impact on diversity issues in the legal profession;

► enhancing access and equality in employment, economic and educational opportunities;

► advocating and promoting an understanding and awareness of diversity;

► dedication to improving and bridging the relationship between diverse groups; and

▶ proven commitment to creating a culture of diversity and inclusion. ■
